

A Word to Our Visitors

Welcome to Nevada and may your trip be a pleasant one. To help assure its pleasure may we offer the following suggestions:

- While Nevada has no maximum speed regulation on rural highways, it is, however, unlawful to drive at speeds which endanger you or any other individual, and your good judgment must be constantly applied to regulate your speed according to visibility, road conditions, and traffic congestion.
- Before venturing on any unimproved road ask locally. Local inquiry improves your safety and your pleasure.
- You must reduce your speed through all urban areas regardless of size. Observe the speed signs when approaching even the smallest settlement and obey them. Remember you have been traveling at a high rate of speed and what you judge to be a greatly reduced rate may be too fast to stop for children or suddenly appearing cross traffic. Let your speedometer be your guide.
- Upon meeting or overtaking a school bus which has stopped and is displaying a flashing red signal you must come to a complete stop and not proceed until such time as the flashing red signal ceases operation. This law applies on all Nevada highways, rural roads, and city streets.

Our traffic laws are comparable with those of other states. Watch your hand signals; dim your lights; park off the highway; and above all, observe the "No Passing" areas. These are plainly marked and are clearly illustrated on the reverse side of this page.

In fenced areas watch for cattle and deer on the highways, especially at night.

It is unlawful to throw burning matches or cigarettes from your automobile. Many disastrous range fires are started each year from this practice. Our livestock men depend upon the desert forage for a great share of their cattle feed, and we solicit your cooperation in avoiding man-made fires.

See the pictures on the reverse of this map. They were selected at random, and each offers unique charm—a stretch of highway and a glimpse of tall pines and imposing hills—seen from Clear Creek Road in the Sierra Nevada Mountains leading from Carson City to Lake Tahoe; a scene in the magnificent Ruby Mountain country, in Elko County—abounding in beautiful streams and wild life; gigantic kilns in White Pine County—built in early days when coal was scarce and pinon pine was plentiful and used to produce fuel for blacksmiths' forges and for smelting furnaces; a splash of radiant color in the desert, the Beavertail Cactus—its natural habitat, the Las Vegas area; a restful pastoral scene in Lyon County—portraying the rich fertility of the region; a view in Kingston Canyon, Lander County, in the Toiyabe Range—where some of the peaks reach altitudes over 10,000 feet; and Cave Rock, Lake Tahoe—through which a man-blasted tunnel made possible alignment for a shore-line drive which affords a breathtaking panoramic view of this wonderland of the Sierras.
