

A WORD TO OUR VISITORS

Welcome to Nevada and may your trip be a pleasant one. To help assure this, please refer to the following suggestions:

CAUTION: Before venturing on any unimproved road, locally local, inquire of the local authority and your driver. Also, many unimproved roads and local roads have no indication of mileage signs for your driving convenience.

You must reduce your speed through all areas where regulations of law. Observe the speed signs when approaching areas that are unimproved and where there are sharp curves, steep grades, and other hazards. Remember you have been traveling at a high rate of speed and what you judge to be a greatly reduced rate may be too fast to stop for children or suddenly appearing cross traffic. Let your speedometer be your guide.

When meeting or overtaking a school bus which has stopped or is stopped, observe the flashing red lights. Do not pass until the flashing red lights have stopped and the school bus has moved forward. This law applies on all Nevada highways, rural roads, and city streets.

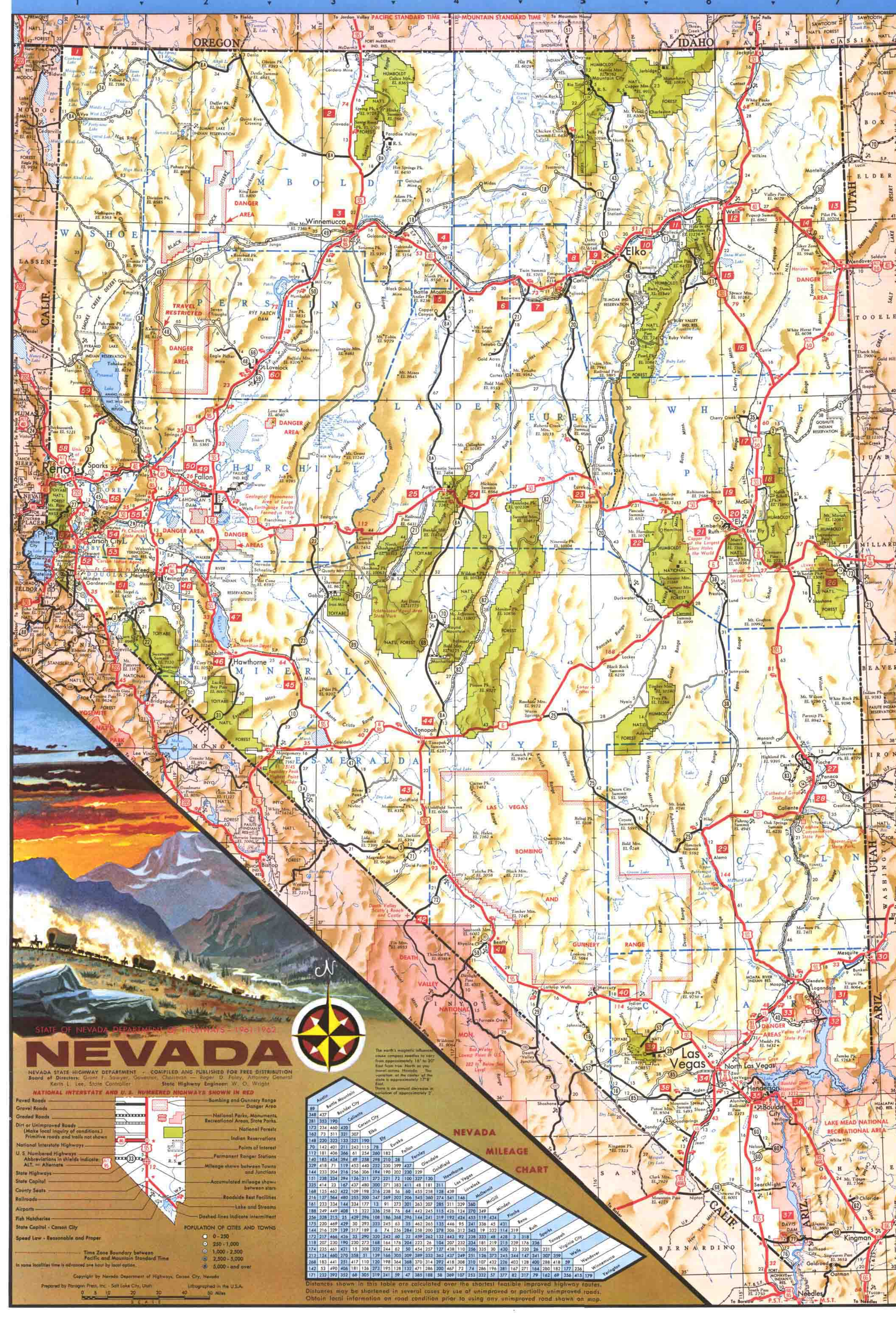
Our traffic laws are comparable with those of other states. Watch your hand signals and obey all signs. Observe the "No Passing" and other signs.

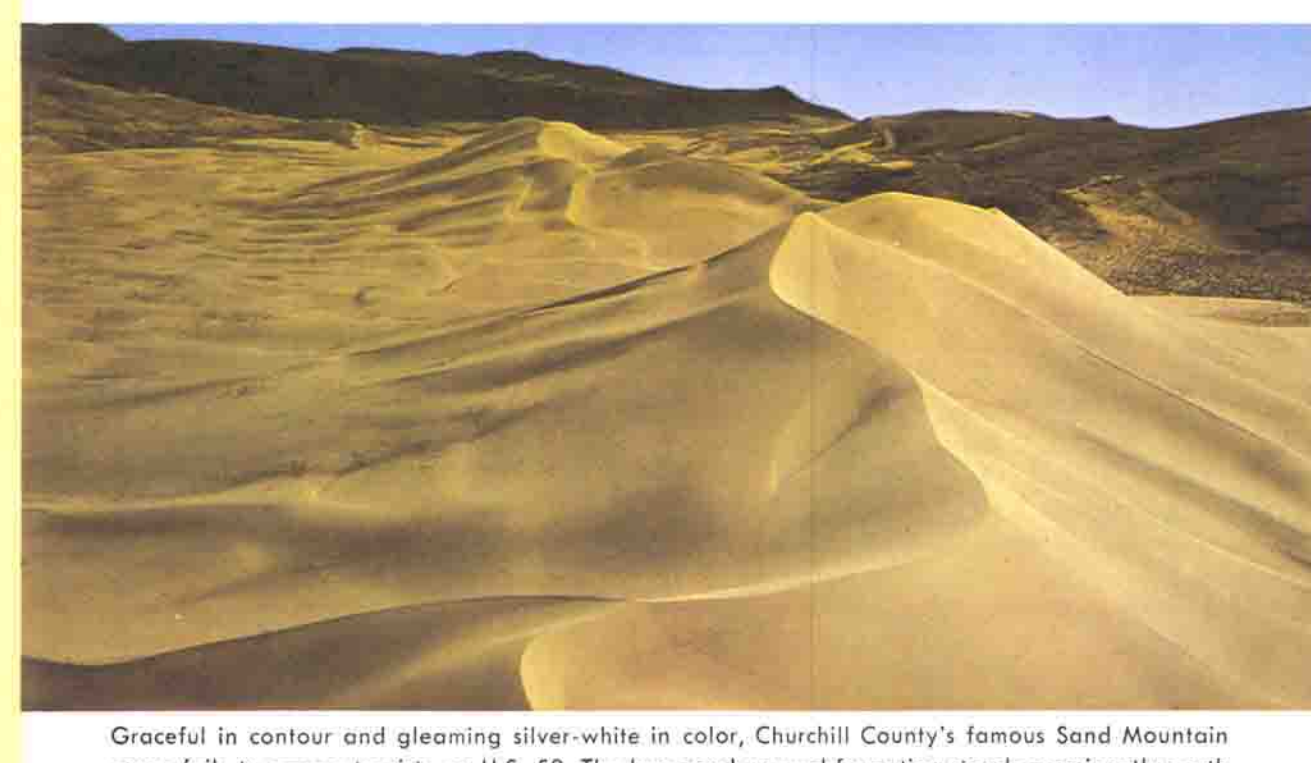

Graceful in contour and gleaming silver-white in color, Churchill County's famous Sand Mountain never fails to amaze tourists on U.S. 50. The huge and unusual formation stands prominently north of the highway about twenty-six miles east of Fallon.



Here is ample evidence that forests once grew in Nevada where today are only deserts. These petrified logs are located in Washoe County. To remove or damage geologically rare specimens such as these is punishable under Nevada law.



These colorful underground mineral formations in upper Elko County is regarded as tops for hunting and fishing. Rugged but lovely scenery such as this in Copper Basin in eastern Nevada are not far from Wheeler Peak in a unique scenic area which may become a national park — Nevada's first.

FRONT COVER

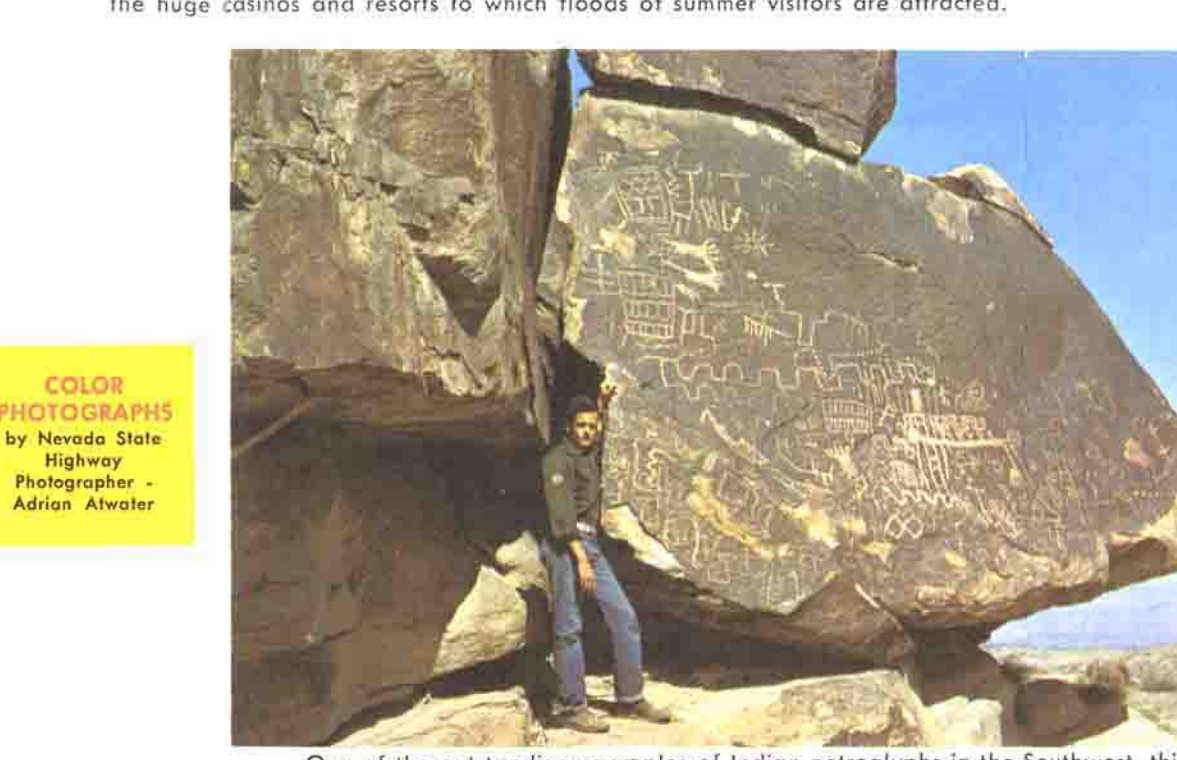
This well-preserved schoolhouse, one of the oldest in the State, is seen at Unionville, boom camp of a hundred years ago. Mark Twain made an unhappy attempt at mining here in 1861 as he describes in "Roughing It". The old camp is located about 20 miles south of Mill City in Pershing County.

BACK COVER

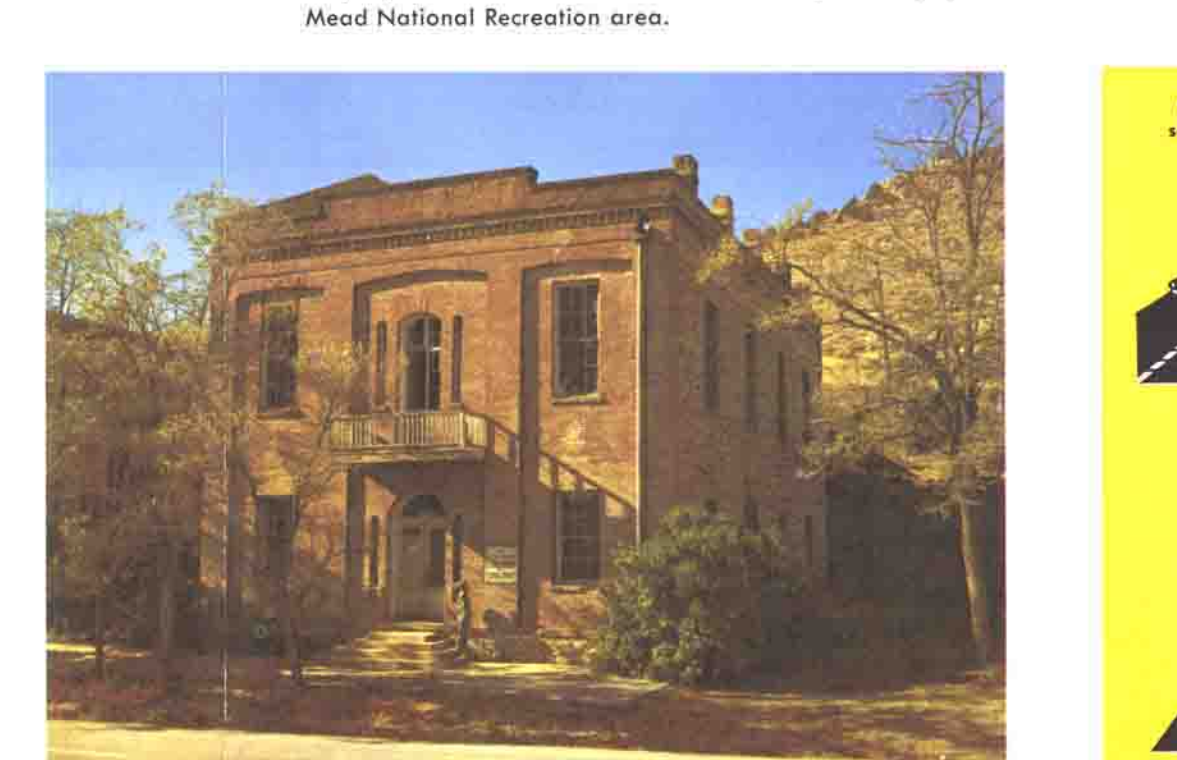
This cinder pit near Lunar Crater in Nye County tells a revealing story about geology. A narrow layer of silt and alluvium cover the thick black cinder bands, showing that volcanic activity is fairly recent. This interesting volcanic area is found near U.S. 6, some 70 miles east of Tonopah.



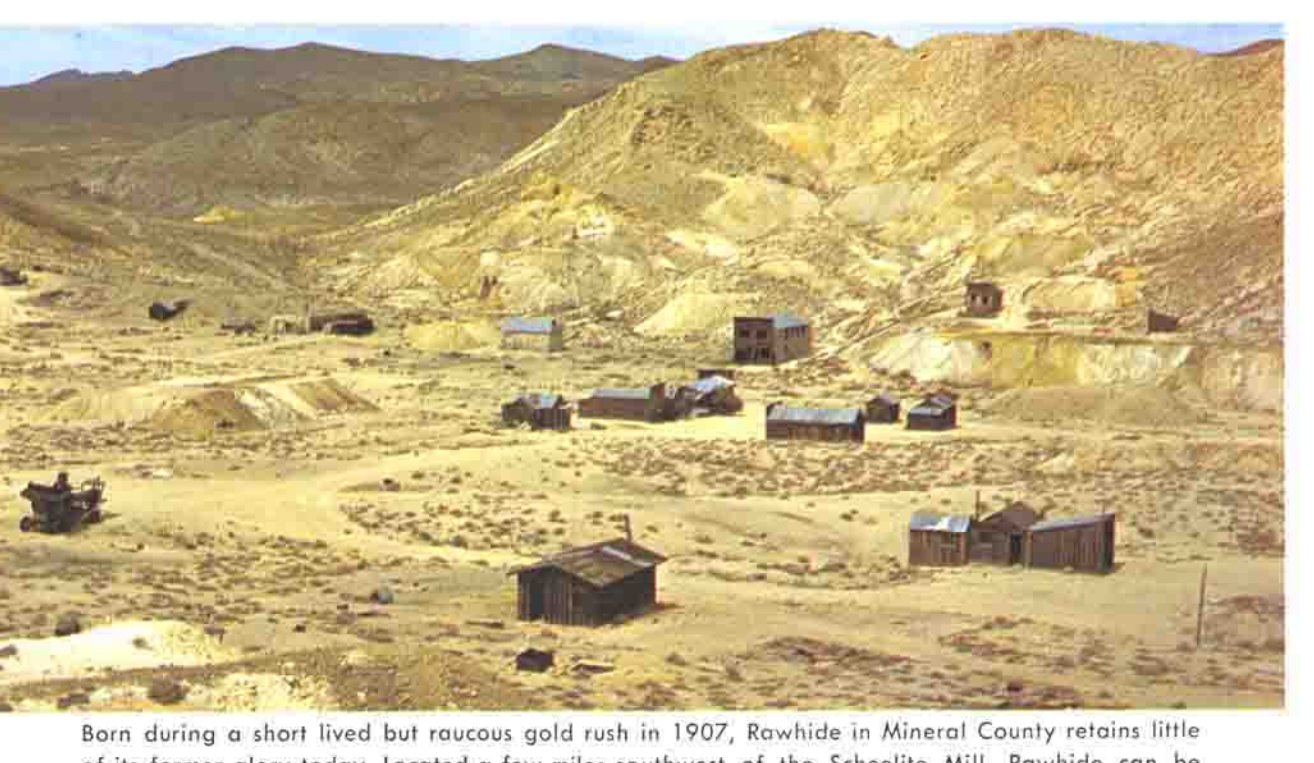

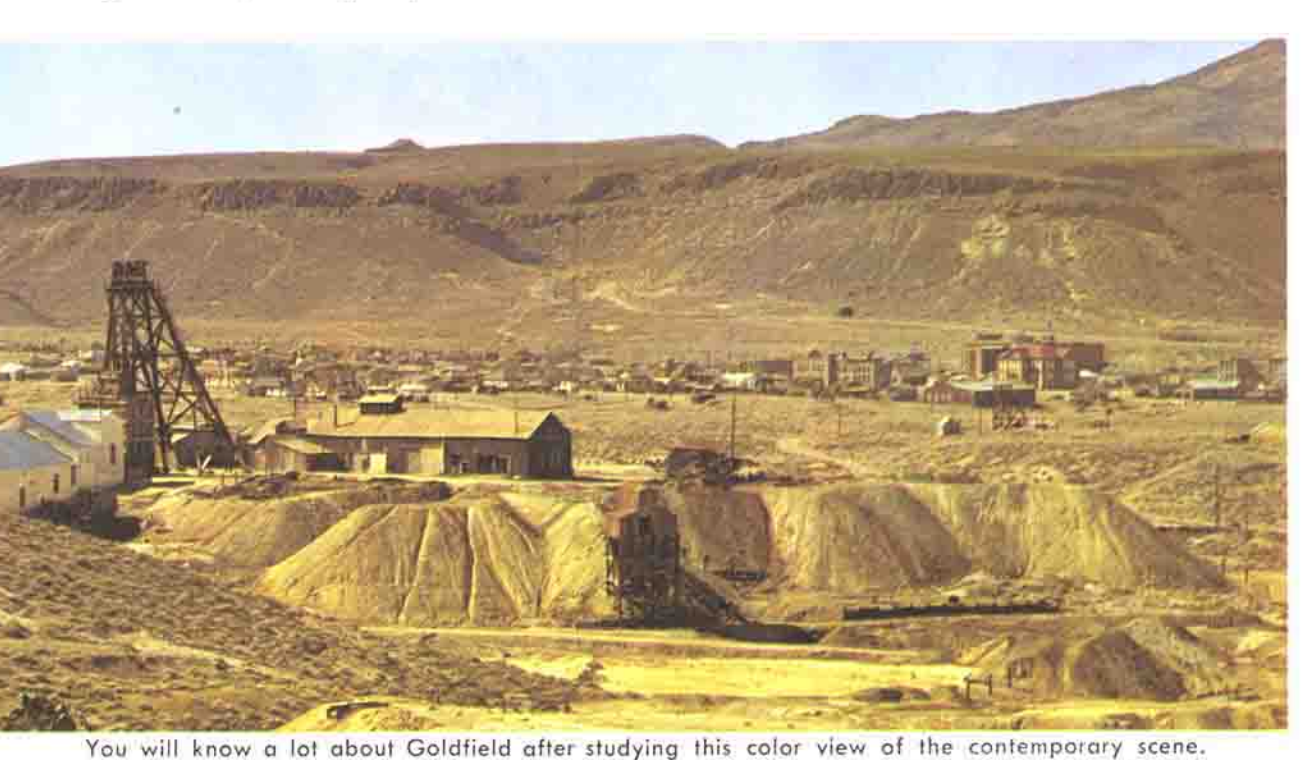

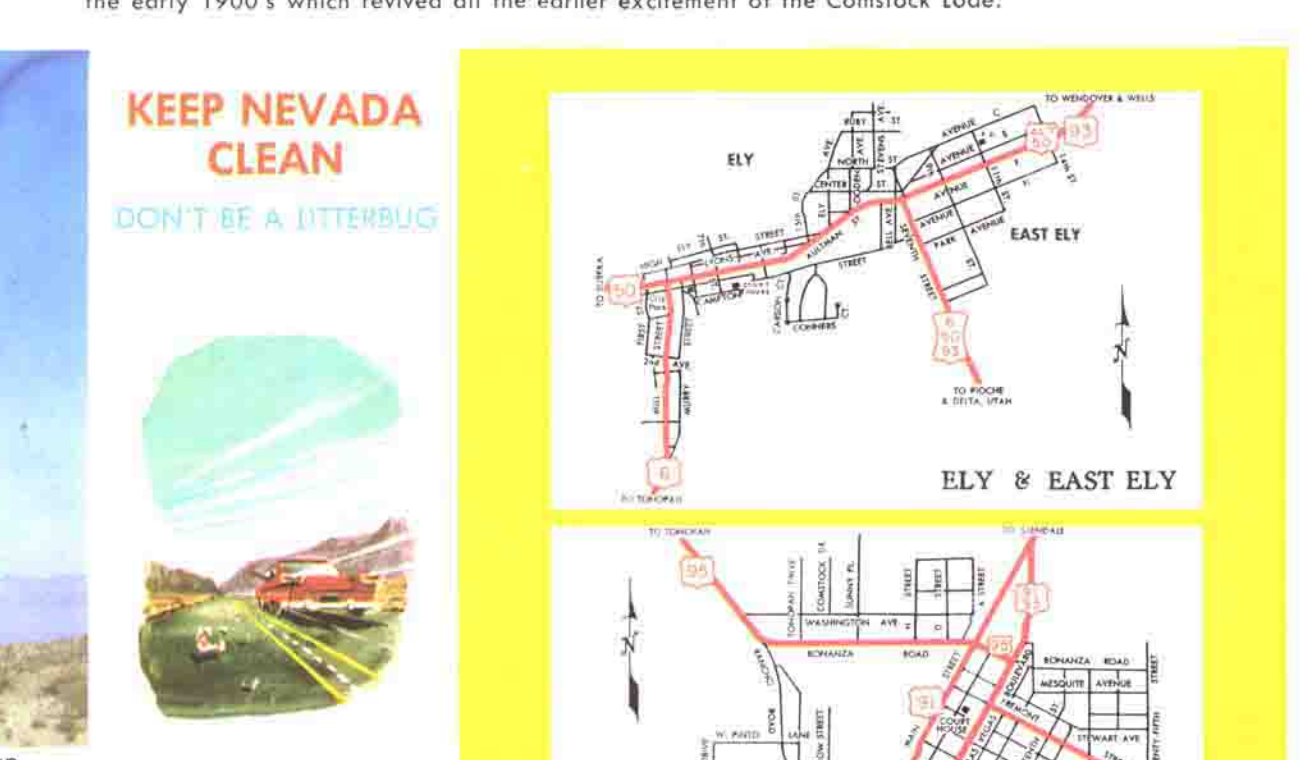

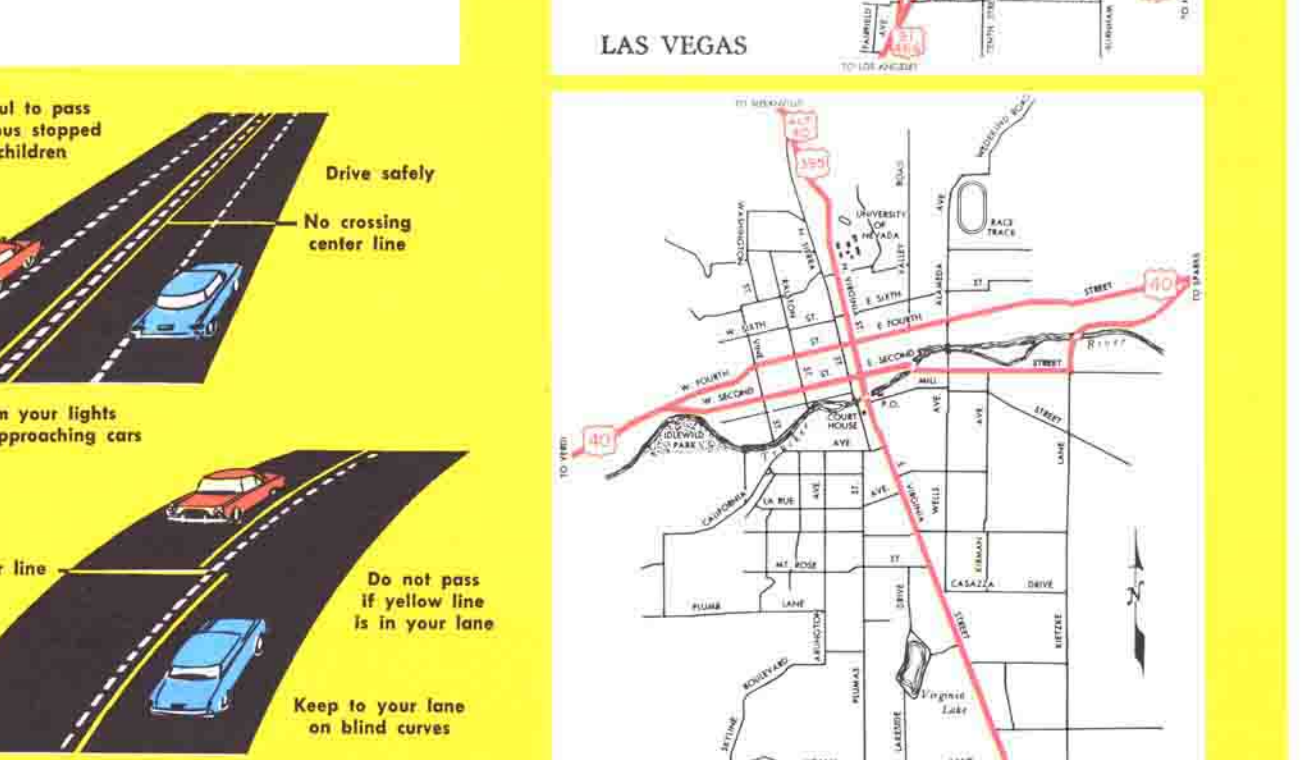
Even during a short lived but raucous gold rush in 1907, Rowland in Mineral County retains little of its former glory today. Located a few miles southwest of the Scheelite Mill, Rowland can be reached from either U.S. 95 or U.S. 50. But visitors should always inquire locally before turning off these paved highways.



You will know a lot about Goldfield after studying this color view of the contemporary scene. Mining dump in the foreground shows scope of the ore operation, while crumbling buildings in background suggest the glory that was Goldfield and Tonopah were the great boom cities of the early 1900's which rivaled all the earlier excitement of the Comstock Lode.
