SCOTT RAWLINS TO SERVE AS DEPUTY DIRECTOR

With the appointment of new NDOT Director Susan Martinovich, Scott Rawlins, P.E., will serve as NDOT deputy director/chief engineer.

Rawlins has worked for the Department for more than 12 years, beginning his NDOT career as a staff I associate engineer in roadway design and moving up through the roadway design and project management divisions, where he worked on or managed more than 40 projects. From planning through environmental studies, final design, and construction, he managed more than \$2 billion in transportation improvements. The new deputy director also gained vast knowledge of southern Nevada while heading some of the area's most vital road projects and studies, from the I-515/Beltway interchange and Hoover Dam Bypass to the I-515 corridor study.

Under his previous appointments as assistant director of engineering, Rawlins guided all preconstruction activities, from design, bridge, traffic/safety and right of way to location, environmental and project management.

Now, the new deputy director looks forward to working with dedicated NDOT staff across the state to assist Director Martinovich in implementing a more efficient, accountable and customer service-oriented vision for the department.

JIM SOUBA NAMED ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, ENGINEERING

Moving to assistant director of engineering will be NDOT's own Jim Souba, P.E.

After more than 20 years overseeing design, construction and maintenance projects around the globe in the U.S. Navy Civil Engineer Corps, Souba became NDOT assistant chief roadway design engineer in 2002. In the position, he led implementation of the Landscape and Aesthetics Master Plan, a plan guiding statewide aesthetic road improvements that received the Nevada Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects' Project of the Year award.

After being promoted to NDOT chief maintenance and operations engineer in 2004, Souba served NDOT by overseeing statewide maintenance administration, as well as the intelligent transportation program and capital improvement program for all NDOT buildings and non-highway facilities.

As assistant director of engineering, Souba will now supervise seven NDOT divisions and approximately 340 engineering and right-of-way professionals responsible for design and specifications of NDOT construction projects. Improving customer service and project accountability while continuing the department's record of outstanding road projects will be a main goal.

"I am committed to helping ensure the success of the department," the new assistant director explained. "We have so many great people here to work with."

DASHBOARD PROGRAM LIGHTS UP NEW VIEW OF NDOT PROJECTS

Dynamic, interactive views of NDOT projects. Easy-to-share project documents. It will all soon be available through new software developed by NDOT Roadway Design.

DASHBOARD- Project Reporting System

Dashboard software will be unveiled in early 2007. Available through NDOT's internal intranet, project management and PCEMS data will be transformed into easy-to-read charts of project status and cost, including:

The program will even designate on-schedule, behind-schedule and projects in danger of running behind schedule by different colors to allow more convenient project tracking. Data will be updated nightly to reflect latest costs and scheduling.

PSAMS- Project Management System

Meanwhile, PSAMS, short for Project Scheduling and Management System, will develop realistic project timelines as project task deadlines are managed and project managers share crucial documents on-line. PSAMS will be phased onto the NDOT intranet in the next few years following thorough software development, testing and training.

"All of this information will be easily available to all NDOT employees. It will no longer be tucked in file cabinets," explained PSAMS and dashboard project manager John Koster.


Both technologies will combine the best of commercial scheduling and workflow management software, and help propel the Roadway Design and Project Management Divisions toward a new matrix management system allowing all working groups to more fully integrate into project development.

GOLDFIELD CREW 175




Between Las Vegas and Reno lies the historic town of Goldfield—and an NDOT maintenance crew responsible for preserving the vital U.S. 95 link connecting Nevada history and Las Vegas glitz.

For the four-man Goldfield Crew 175, winter brings snowplowing duties atop the 7,400-foot Lida Summit and 6,097-foot high Goldfield Summit, not to mention the other 228 lane miles under their responsibility. Summer heat brings construction projects from overlays to shoulder safety improvements. In fact, the Goldfield crew recently overlayed a 43-mile stretch of the SR 266 scenic shortcut between Las Vegas and Yosemite with help from Tonopah, Beatty and Montgomery Pass teams. Extensive profile work also flattened road and shoulder surfaces. Next year, a chip seal will complete the road improvements.

The crew also maintains Scotty's Castle Road and State Route 774 to historic Gold Point, a rustic 1860-era mining town now home to just over 10 hearty residents. Recently credited with saving the life of a pregnant accident victim and preventing a flammable cargo truck from being engulfed in flames, Crew 175 is also no stranger to the life-saving work performed daily by NDOT maintainers.

"We work together really well," George Robertson explained of the team's 38 combined years of NDOT maintenance success.
