

how to put the safety strategies to work. Those various workshops held throughout the year culminated in a recent Safety Summit, held March 18 and 19 in Henderson.

"The goal of the Strategic Highway Safety Plan is to reduce traffic deaths by 100 in 2008," NDOT Principal Safety Engineer Chuck Reider said. "This summit brought transportation, safety and police organizations together to develop programs, alliances and education campaigns to reduce traffic fatalities by helping motorists drive more safely."

One potential program developed in the summit was possible private business and organization sponsorship to generate funding for additional DUI checkpoints, and an educational program introducing eighth-grade students to the rules of the road.

"I'm impressed with the statewide collaboration," Thomas-Boyers said in a presentation during the summit. "Fight on Nevada, fight on for a safety culture."

SAFETY FACTS

- Traffic crashes are one of the leading causes of deaths in Nevada and across the nation.
- The societal cost of traffic crashes in the Las Vegas valley was recently estimated at \$2.7 billion a year, or \$1,572 per Las Vegan, by an American Automobile Association study.
- The Nevada Strategic Highway Safety Plan emphasizes enforcement, education, emergency services and engineering.

ONE-STOP SHOP FOR SOUTHERN NEVADA PROJECT INFORMATION







The new NDOT southern Nevada combined project information office provides the public easy access to road project information.

From right-of-way and roadway design to construction lane closures, much goes into NDOT construction projects. NDOT recently unveiled a Las Vegas public outreach office that will serve as a one-stop source for all the important details of many southern Nevada freeway projects.

The new project hub offers maps, timelines, fact sheets, progress updates and animated views of such NDOT southern Nevada projects as the Interstate 15 design-build widening project, I-15 express lanes, U.S. 95 northwest widening project and others. Public information consultant staff are also available at the office to discuss issues, take comments and answer questions.

"These major freeway improvements affect people's lives," NDOT Director Susan Martinovich said in a media event announcing the project office. "We want to provide information and hear feedback on these projects that are so important to the transportation infrastructure of Nevada."

Located in the U.S. 95 widening project office, the new combined project office brings together previously separate public outreach offices into one easy location on Valley View Boulevard, near the U.S. 95 and Interstate 15 intersection. The office is open Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Fridays from 8 a.m. to noon.

Soon, the one-stop information center will go on-line with the launch of an NDOT Web site where interested citizens can find project information, sign up for e-mail updates and provide feedback on all projects detailed in the project office.

NDOT PROJECT NAMED "TRANSPORTATION PROJECT OF THE YEAR"

They helped smooth transportation in Las Vegas' evergrowing southwest corridor. Now, two Interstate 15 interchanges have been named 2007 Nevada transportation projects of the year.

The Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE) recognized the Blue Diamond and East Silverado Ranch Boulevard interchanges for the positive impact the projects have had on southern Nevada transportation.

BLUE DIAMOND INTERCHANGE

Where I-15 meets State Route 160 south of the Vegas Strip, the Blue Diamond interchange was built to accommodate an evergrowing amount of traffic between Las Vegas and the expanding bedroom community of Pahrump. The NDOT project replaced the previous two-lane rural highway interchange with a new eightlane diamond interchange. The project also included construction of additional Interstate lanes, hydraulic features, pedestrian and bicycle facilities and other improvements.

NDOT crew 902 worked over two years overseeing the project.

"The phasing of this project was extremely well-planned," crew 902 Interim Resident Engineer Elizabeth Jackson explained. "We kept traffic open almost continuously, all while tearing down the previous bridge and replacing it with another."

For keeping the project running smoothly, the crew credits weekly status meetings that brought all stakeholders together,

from construction contractors and NDOT project managers to utilities stakeholders and others. Another distinguishing element of the project, says the crew, are stunning southwestern landscape features that have already made the interchange a landmark.

Another vital element of the project was a dedicated NDOT design and development team. More information on the team is available to NDOT employees through the Public Information page of the NDOT SharePoint Web site.

The ITE award adds to the collection of awards earned by the project. The American Public Works Association named the interchange Nevada's public works transportation project of the year between \$10 and \$100 million. The interchange was also selected as the year's best transportation project by Southwest Contractor magazine.

EAST SILVERADO RANCH BOULEVARD

Located just south of the Blue Diamond interchange, the East Silverado Ranch Boulevard interchange was also named an ITE transportation project of the year. The Clark County project reduced residential traffic congestion on the Blue Diamond interchange by offering additional freeway access points.

NDOT Crew 914's Mike Bridges, as well as NDOT design and Las Vegas right-of-way and permit office personnel, all assisted to ensure that any project-related activity on NDOT right-of-way met state specifications and provided the safest, most effective interchange possible.
