

NDOT Brings Agencies Together To Quickly Clear Crashes

NDOT has joined with other southern Nevada transportation and safety agencies to sign an agreement for quicker and safer clearance of the over 15,000 traffic accidents that occur each year on major Las Vegas roads.

The Open Roads Partnership Agreement was signed last month by NDOT, Nevada Highway Patrol (NHP), Clark County, the City of Las Vegas, Las Vegas Metro Police Department and the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada's FAST and NHP emergency and traffic command center. The agreement lays out how the agencies will work together to reach new accident clearance goals, from a 30-minute maximum time for minor, non-injury crashes to 90 minutes for fatal incidents. The agreement also defines how NDOT will assist the NHP and FAST to provide traffic control, remove vehicles and material spills and identify detour routes.

"The agreement puts into writing many of the ways that our agencies already work together, and sets specific clearance time goals," Joe Martinez, NDOT assistant district engineer for maintenance, said.

"Currently, the majority of incidents involving property damage are cleared in 10 minutes," NHP Major Phil Tilt explained. "While that is a very quick response, any incident that requires closing our roadways has great impact. This is an opportunity to continually enhance our response and the safety of our roads."

"By quickly clearing crashes, we will also help alleviate congestion and make the commute safer and quicker," NDOT Deputy Director Scott Rawlins said.

The agreement marks a major milestone for the Traffic Incident Management Coalition (TIM). Overseen by NDOT through consulting firm Iteris Inc., the TIM brings 40-plus representatives from various first response agencies together in monthly meetings to develop traffic incident management advances that include improved communications, coordination and cooperation while developing combined agency policies and procedures for quick accident clearance. 
PLANNING AHEAD: 2028 LONG-RANGE TRANSPORTATION PLAN

Where will you be in 2028? NDOT's recently-completed 2008-2028 statewide long-range transportation plan helps answer that question for the state transportation system.

The 20-year policy planning document is a comprehensive look at Nevada's transportation system, from highways, aviation and bicycles to pedestrians, mass transit, rail and freight through 2028. The plan also details the public input and principles that guide the Department in all it does, from safety, customer service and asset management to mobility and environmental stewardship.

Development of the plan began in 2004. Public meetings were held across the state, over 500 public survey responses were tallied, and numerous meetings with metropolitan planning organizations, cities, counties, tribes, and other state agencies were held, all to help establish a shared vision for Nevada's transportation system.

"We heard from our citizens, businesses and government agencies that they want safe accessibility and mobility to enhance Nevada's economy, while preserving our way of life and environment," NDOT Long-Range and Small Urban Manager





This feedback was incorporated into the plan to reflect the opinions of our system users."



HENDERSON LANDSCAPING PROJECT COMES UP A WINNER



Nevada's American Public Works Association chapter named the landscaping effort state Transportation Project of the Year under \$5 million, and presented the award to NDOT Landscape Architect Supervisor Lucy Joyce at a recent State Transportation Board meeting. The approximately \$4 million project, completed in May 2007, joins abstract elements of the City of Henderson logo with wildlife images from the city's bird preserve. Painted and stained surfaces, multi-color rock and drought-tolerant plants bring more color to the 60 acres of landscaping.

A partner in the project, the City of Henderson reimbursed NDOT for a portion of utility set-up fees, and

contributes to ongoing landscape maintenance and utility costs.

The project was developed using NDOT's landscape and aesthetics master plan established in 2002. The plan incorporates landscape and aesthetics as important aspects of state highways; reflecting scenic, historic, aesthetic and environmental elements of the area.

"Landscape and aesthetics are an important part of our roadways," Joyce said. "The aesthetic benefits can not only improve and define corridors, cities, and tourism, but can help relax drivers," Joyce said. "In addition, they help improve air quality and provide dust control."
