ENHANCING SAFETY IN ELKO

NDOT recently completed a traffic roundabout to increase safety and travel on an Elko-area road.

On State Route 227, known as Lamoille Highway, traffic traveling between Elko and the communities of Spring Creek and Lamoille has increased. Increased traffic has led to heightened travel speeds, congestion and safety concerns. NDOT has installed a roundabout at the intersection of Spring Creek Parkway and Lamoille Highway to help reduce those concerns.

"The main goal behind this roundabout is to increase mobility and safety," NDOT District 3 Traffic Engineer Randy Hesterlee explained. "Vehicles driving in roundabouts are driving slower and do not meet at the right angles that you find in fourway stop intersections. Because of this, crashes are often reduced and, if they do occur, are not as severe. Roundabouts also have a higher operational efficiency than many alternatives."

Installation of the roundabout followed discussions with the public, Elko County Commission, Elko County Regional Transportation Commission, Spring Creek Association Board of Directors and other stakeholders, as well as extensive NDOT educational efforts to provide roundabout information to community members unfamiliar with the type of intersection.

The approximately \$2 million project was constructed by Eagle Peak Rock and Paving and overseen by NDOT crew 918. The roundabout features a Ruby Mountain-themed centerpiece in the middle designed by Spring Creek High School students.

The Spring Creek roundabout joins other state roundabouts already improving traffic flow and safety in many areas, including in Fernley and on State Route 88 in Minden.



WHAT IS A ROUNDABOUT

One-way circular intersections in which traffic flows around a center island without stop signs or signals, roundabouts provide distinct safety benefits. Because traffic enters and exits through right turns only and speeds are reduced, the occurrence of severe crashes is substantially less. Lower speeds within roundabouts also allow entering traffic to access smaller gaps between circulating vehicles, increasing traffic volume and decreasing delays, congestion, fuel consumption and air pollution.

In Las Vegas' bustling northern suburbs, NDOT has just broken ground on phase 1 of the U.S. 95 Northwest Corridor Improvements Project to improve freeway travel, safety and aesthetics.

The project, built in partnership with the City of Las Vegas, will expand and improve U.S. 95 between Washington Avenue and Ann Road, construct a Durango Drive loop ramp and extend high occupancy vehicle lanes into the U.S. 95 northern corridor. The corridor is a vital link for commuters traveling between downtown Las Vegas and the city's northwest communities, with the number of vehicles using the corridor nearly doubling in the past decade alone.

"The area has greatly expanded over past years with new residential areas and commercial developments," NDOT Senior Project Manager Jenica Finnerty explained. "This project will help allow the freeway to safely and efficiently accommodate the development seen in recent years, as well as any future developments."

The approximately \$69 million project to be overseen by NDOT crew 926 and built by Capriati Construction is expected to complete in 2012. The project is part of five phases of improvements to the northern U.S. 95 corridor. Currently, NDOT and partners are also completing a new interchange at U.S. 95 and Horse Drive. Other future phases of improvements, such as widening U.S. 95 from Ann Road to Kyle Canyon Road, a system-to-system interchange at the U.S. 95/Clark County 215 northern beltway intersection and a new service interchange at Kyle Canyon Road, will be constructed over coming years as needed to accommodate increased development and traffic.

The improvements will reduce congestion, drive time and environmentally-damaging emissions from stop and go traffic. The projects will also serve to beautify the corridor, improve driver safety and comfort as well as enhance freeway interchanges and access into residential and commercial areas.

"It's going to change the quality of life out here," Las Vegas City Councilman Steven Ross said at an Aug. 3 groundbreaking ceremony. "People are going to commute to and from work safer. The amenities- the beautiful landscaping, the sound walls, the bridges- it is all going to be just a spectacular thing."

Many NDOT staff dedicated themselves to bringing the I-15 North Design-Build Project to a successful and early completion. Now, the freeway widening, completed ahead of schedule on Las Vegas' busiest freeway, is in the running for America's Transportation Awards People's Choice Award and supporters can vote for the project to be named the nation's best.

The American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials has recognized the freeway improvements as one of the nation's top 10 road projects for timely completion and innovative construction. The approximately \$250 million project, overseen by NDOT crew 916 and built by North Corridor Constructors, a joint venture between CH2M Hill and Las Vegas Paving Corporation, widened and improved the I-15 corridor north of the spaghetti bowl to improve traffic flow. The project also included very strong collaboration between NDOT and the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada FAST division. The FAST operations center is a cooperative partnership of NDOT and the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada to operate and maintain the valley's dynamic message signs, freeway ramp meters and traffic cameras.

The project marked the first time NDOT used the design-build strategy of constructing early project



phases as final project elements are being designed. The process helped shave a year off construction. In addition to public support, innovative construction and dedicated partnering also helped contribute to an additional eight-month time savings, allowing the project to be substantially completed after only 28

months in December 2009.

"There is so much work, dedication and expertise that goes into a successful road project of this size," said NDOT Director Susan Martinovich. "This recognition truly goes to NDOT staff and partners who worked so hard on this important project. Partnering with our contractors, implementing 'outside-of-the-box' strategies, and receiving support from the public also made this project a huge success."

The NDOT project competed against 43 road projects across the nation to be named one of the top 10. The project is now in the running for the America's Transportation Awards Grand Prize and the People's Choice Award, to

be presented this fall. If the project wins either award, the State of Nevada would receive a \$10,000 cash prize to donate to a charity or scholarship fund.
