



NDOT received the Associated General Contractors of America Marvin M. Black Excellence in Partnering Award for the I-15 North Design-Build Project in Las Vegas.


Partnering was a cornerstone of the project from the start. NDOT collaborated with contractor North Corridor Constructors, a joint venture of CH2M Hill and Las Vegas Paving Corporation, to design and build the project which widened and improved a nearly six-mile segment of Interstate 15 from U.S. 95 to Craig Road. As the department's first designbuild project, the final phases of construction were designed as earlier phases were built. NDOT Crew 916 oversaw project construction for NDOT. The project team implemented formal quarterly partnering meetings and more frequent informal meetings, as well as weekly inspection drives through the entire project. Through this and other collaboration, innovations were developed to complete the project in early 2010 almost 10 months ahead of schedule, helping to relieve traffic congestion, increase safety and reduce costs while building a better interstate.

"Partnering is our way of doing business," NDOT Director Susan Martinovich explained. "Working together, we can complete projects faster and with better quality." The Marvin M. Black Excellence in Partnering Award recognizes unique and successful partnerships used to complete complex projects. A panel of judges evaluated a record number of project nominations for contractors' ability to resolve conflicts, the quality of communication with all parties and ability to work with many groups to achieve one goal, among other key criteria. NDOT's I-15 North Design-Build project was one of only two projects to receive the prestigious award for successful construction partnership in 2010. The award is a highlight of nearly 15 commendations received for the project.

"This caliber of award shows the quality of work that we are doing at NDOT," Mary Martini, NDOT District 1 engineer, said. "I am proud of everyone involved, in particular the NDOT employees who participated in this project."

As a successful businessman and fifth-generation Nevadan, Savage says one of his main goals while serving on the State Transportation Board is to have a quality master plan ensuring standards of excellence in safety, maintenance and fiscal responsibility for our transportation throughout our state.

"In a state as big as Nevada, our transportation system is vital to both the citizens of Nevada and our tourists each and every day," the board member says. "Their safety and comfort should be our number one priority."

Savage is president of Savage and Son Plumbing and Heating, a Reno-based company steeped in Nevada history. Leonard Coates Savage, a miner in Virginia City, owned a mining claim in the 1800s that later became part of the famed Comstock Lode and the third largest supplier of silver in Nevada. A founding partner in a Virginia City mining and plumbing goods store, Genesy & Savage Plumbing, Leonard's son Frank Charles started his one-man Savage and Son plumbing business in 1893 on downtown Reno's Sierra Street. The business flourished and grew through today to become one of the oldest plumbing companies in the United States, according to "Plumbing & Mechanical" magazine.



NEW PROFESSIONAL ENGINEER

NDOT Engineer Jae Pullen recently reached a milestone in his professional career by becoming certified as a Professional Engineer.

Pullen received his PE license in January after undergoing rigorous engineering training, receiving a bachelor's degree and Fundamentals of Engineering certification and more than four years of engineering experience at NDOT.

The eight-hour PE exam demands intense knowledge of all civil engineering areas as well as specialty knowledge in transportation. For the October 2010 exam, Pullen began studying in May by covering a topic a month. He estimates that he spent over 200 hours studying with one objective in mind.

"I didn't want to take the test again," Pullen says, adding that taking a sample test to get a feel for the pace of the exam was instrumental.

Although he was nervous about the test, Pullen found the key to taking the exam was not answering the questions in order, but rather solving the ones he knew first. "This helped build up my confidence, so I could then go back to the ones I was unsure of," he says. "It's really a mental game."

District II Urban Traffic Engineer Anita Lyday was very helpful during the study process, giving him invaluable pointers when he got stuck. Pullen also credits his wife's support throughout the entire endeavor. "When I doubted myself, she never did."

As far as his career goals, Pullen knows that getting his professional license is a milestone that opens up more opportunities, but says for now he's just happy to have a job that he really enjoys. He started with NDOT in July 2005 as a rotational engineer, then worked in District II Bridge Maintenance and the District II Traffic Office.

The NDOT engineer is currently instrumental in the Washoe Valley Wind Study. "We are just revising the final draft report that will update the wind system in Washoe Valley and the I-580 extension. We are adding new variables and recommendations that factor in road conditions and wind direction, not just wind speed," Pullen explains. "We want truck drivers to have a higher level of confidence and believe in the system."



WASHOE VALLEY WIND STUDY

NDOT's wind warning system, located along U.S. 395 and State Route 429 (Old 395/Bowers Mansion Road) between Reno and Carson City, automatically posts wind warnings and prohibitions based on wind speed. A "High Profile Vehicles Prohibited" message prohibiting high-profile vehicles from U.S. 395 during 40-mile-per-hour wind gusts or high sustained winds of 30 miles per hour or greater is posted on four overhead freeway digital message signs and radio road reports. The premier NDOT system allows high-profile vehicles to avoid the area during high winds.

The Washoe Valley Wind Study will recommend whether the system may need to be updated or modified, and also evaluate the best high wind warning system for the new Interstate 580 freeway being built.
