Mitch Ison in his own words!

When did you start working at NDOT? April 1, 2013.

Tell us about your background. What are some of the jobs or positions vou held before working in Research?

I have been working in libraries for almost twenty years. I received my master's degree in library science (MLS) in 1999 from Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana. I've been working as a professional reference librarian since 2000. My first position was at the Sacramento Public Library. I later moved to the El Dorado County, California Library. More recently I worked at the Nevada State Library from 2004 to 2013, when I started at NDOT.

Tell us about your life or your interests outside of work.

I'm an avid mountain biker (and frequent mountain bike crasher, but I don't let that stop me). I'm also into road biking. I like hiking, especially backpacking. I try to do at least one backpack trip each summer. Last year, I went on an incredible week long, 50 mile trip in southern Yosemite. I'm also into digital photography and reading science fiction.

What surprised you the most about the Research Library?

I shouldn't have been, but I was pleasantly surprised to see just how much the department supports its library. In a time when so many government agencies are failing to see the value of their libraries it was gratifying to see that NDOT does see the value (including overall cost savings) of providing access to quality information services for its employees.

Describe your day to day duties.

I've been very busy with a large project to get all the books and other materials in the collection entered into our online catalog and labeled with Library of Congress catalog system call numbers for easy retrieval. This takes up a great deal of my time. I'm also busy answering requests from NDOT staff, including answering questions, research, and locating items for loan from other libraries (interlibrary loan).

What is the one thing you wish everyone knew about the Research Library?

I want NDOT staff to know that the library isn't just a bunch of bookshelves collecting dust. The library is an active and modern resource available to them to assist with their research needs. The Research library offers an increasing access to electronic materials available on their desktops, such as the ASCE Journal Collection, the ASTM Standards Database, and the Lynda.com Online Training Library, along with access to interlibrary loan materials from a unique network of dedicated transportation libraries across the country.

What is the biggest change you would like to see implemented?

The world of information is evolving at lightning speed, and researchers rightly expect to access library materials on their desktops. Subscriptions to ASCE Journals, ASTM Standards and Lynda.com are the first steps in supplying access to the very best online content available. I want to continue to expand access to electronic resources through additional online journal subscriptions and ebooks. I also plan to add content to our website and intranet page to allow increased access to the wealth of quality information available for free on the internet. (But have no fear, paper books and reports will still be available!)

The Nevada DOT library contains nearly 20 thousand volumes covering the entire range of transportation related subjects. The majority of the print collection includes materials from TRB, AASHTO and FHWA. Other important materials include NDOT reports and engineering exam study manuals. The collection can be searched via the library's online catalog which features both basic and expert interfaces, along with current library news and links to free online resources. And of course the librarian is always happy to assist via telephone, email or in person. In addition, the library provides access to over 75 magazines and journals including online access to the ASCE Journal Collection; a full list of titles that can be found in the Library News section of the online catalog. In addition to the ASCE Journals, database access includes the ASTM International Standards database, an industry leader in the development of standards worldwide, and the Lynda.com Online Training Library. Lynda logins are checked out for a 14 day period and may be renewed. Please contact the library for a login.

Nevada LTAP By: Jim Nichols

Many local agencies in states are required to take on the responsibility for administering construction of roadway projects in rural area having populations less than 50,000 and projects costing \$2 million or less. Although Nevada has what is considered to be an urban population, it is because the population is centered in two urban areas, Las Vegas and Reno. The truth of the matter is that Nevada has vast sparsely populated areas with widely spaced infrastructure construction projects which nevertheless need monitoring and oversight. The National Cooperative Highway Research Program (NCHRP) has just published Research Digest 381 titled <u>Guidebook for Construction Management Practices for Rural Projects</u>.

The LTAP (T²) Center is developing a training course based on this NCHRP report but will be tailored to Nevada's situation. The course will present information on:

• Contract Administration •Cost Estimating •Inspection •Scheduling • Quality Assurance and Control •Construction Safety • Claims and Disputes

The course will be targeted to project managers and senior field personnel of local and regional transportation agencies who have not been exposed to construction management but will begin having responsibilities for implementing and administering roadway construction projects. The course is expected to be completed and ready for presentation in the fall of this year.
